# The Convention for the Conservation of Salmon in the North Atlantic Ocean



- Commits Parties *inter alia* to:
  - conserve, restore, and rationally manage salmon
  - acquire, analyse and disseminate scientific information
  - consult non-NASCO Parties where actions adversely affect salmon
- NASCO Parties: Canada, Denmark (Faroe Islands & Greenland), European Union, Norway, Russian Federation, United States of America
- 42 accredited NGOs
- Prohibits fishing for salmon beyond 12 nautical miles except at West Greenland (up to 40nm) and around the Faroe Islands (up to 200nm) thereby creating an enormous protected zone free of directed salmon fisheries
- Allows for the establishment of regulatory measures where one Party harvests salmon originating in the rivers of another Party



## **NASCO** Agreements



NASCO has developed agreements inter alia relating to:

- management of salmon fisheries
- habitat protection and restoration
- aquaculture, introductions and transfers and transgenics including the parasite *G. salaris*

Implementation Plans detail the actions to be taken over a five-year period to implement NASCO agreements with annual review of progress; the third cycle has started this year

Theme-based Special Sessions (mini symposia) held on topics related to NASCO agreements to allow detailed exchange of information and identification of best practice


Despite all the sacrifices the abundance of North Atlantic salmon remains low; critically low in some areas and further measures are needed





### Salmon at sea








### **NASCO Rivers Database**

The **wild** North Atlantic Salmon **stock** in each river is **assessed and classified** into the following categories: **Lost** 

Artificially Sustained High Risk Moderate Risk Low Risk Not at Risk (Unknown)

All assessed stocks in the North Atlantic (Excluding unknown)





## Why do we need the IYS?



Salmon are at risk from environmental change and human activities across the Northern Hemisphere.

The epic migrations of salmon through rivers and oceans take them across borders, languages, cultures and economies. Saving these beautiful and influential creatures requires a uniquely large-scale solution.
